

### Overview

The Sasak people of Lombok are among the poorest people groups in Indonesia. Our partner works with them to improve access to basic life necessities through multiple community-based projects, including water projects, educational programs and engaging people with disabilities. The completion of another water project will benefit at least 300 villagers. A further 100 new families and 250 existing families are expected to receive education/follow-up education in caring for loved ones with disabilities and social education programs will be delivered to 120 individuals. This project has a strong emphasis on providing onthe-job training for local specialists to deepen their understanding and transfer knowledge so that the work can become sustainable.

### Impact for December 2021 to May 2022

### people gained access to clean water



due to the provision of 13 reservoir units to 200 village families and the installation of 22 Sawyer water filters in 6 boarding schools and an orphanage. Each centre received health and hygiene education.

#### 278 people living with a disability were

visited multiple times. They were provided with physiotherapy, exercises and assistance tools such as 37 wheelchairs and hundreds of canes, walkers and crutches etc.



### families were given health advocacy

which helps clients access the often free health program assistance from the government and the process of checking into hospital. 50 food packages were delivered to the elderly and the underprivileged who were directly affected by the pandemic.

### 4 key staff members received on-the-job training

by a professional expatriate civil engineer and a physiotherapist, equipping them to lead the organisation in the future without external assistance.





### Fira's Story

Fira is four years old, Her only behaviours were constant, loud clapping and moaning. Her family and neighbours could not sleep and Fira never seemed to rest. When the mobility team met Fira, they provided her with sensory stimulation, trained the family and gave them equipment. The family then committed to helping her with daily therapy. The team recently visited with occupational and special education therapists. Fira now laughs, makes eye contact, has five new words and is sleeping through the night. She has started using her hands and interacts with other children. It is a joy to see her develop.
