Overview


The Democratic Republic of the Congo is one of the most challenging places on the planet. Life expectancy is low and trained health professionals are rare, particularly outside the capital city. Training general practitioners (7 years) and nursing staff (4 years) in one of the worst-affected areas will bring about long-term benefits to this African nation. The project co-funds medical/nursing students in their second year onwards, once students have proven their commitment and reliability. Funding covers 80-90% of the cost of a year's tuition, leaving students to also contribute to the cost of their education.

across 2nd-4th years at the Institute for Medical Technology in Bukavu. Theory and practical courses together with exams were completed. 7/7 nurses graduated in Dec 22.





in the job market stands at 51: 23 nurses, 22 doctors, 4 lab technicians and 2 midwives. Finding gainful employment is challenging in DRC. Graduates often need to leave the city centre to seek jobs.

Students part-fund their studies

10% of nursing fees and 20% of faculty of medicine fees are paid by students' families. This encourages the students to take their studies seriously. With the start of a new 3-year project cycle, funding was increased to help take pressure off the rising costs of living over the past years.

- There are 5 males and 11 females in Medicine and 4 males and 8 females in Nursing. x2 nursing and x1 medical scholarship was added.
- Project Manager Jenny Crameri and CEO Richard Beaumont had a great visit to Panzi Hospital in July 2022 after a 3 year gap due to COVID. They met with many students and faculty. They and we were encouraged!
