Overview

Objectives

Impact



School wash education (S-WASH-E) occurred in 15 schools. 60 latrines, 60 wash basins and 15 water tanks were built. The schools are dedicated to maintaining the toilet facilities, with students assigned to regular rosters for cleaning and inspecting the systems.



Huge

A huge outcome has been communities coming together, especially with the WASH programs in schools, with teachers and parents helping with labour and offering solutions. Effective water committees have been formed to manage the systems.



Health Education Over the past three years, 9,158 students have received essential hygiene and sanitation education. Students learned and are applying health and sanitation practices both at school and home, leading to improved hygiene and increased class attendance.



Claypot water filters and wells

Over the past three years, 13 wells have been built in several communities and 530 clay pot water filters were distributed. This has impacted 715 and 2425 people respectively by ensuring significant improvements in lifestyle, health, and overall future prospects.



Life change

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Pov's Story

Pov, 52, from Kompung Chnang province, shares how access to clean water transformed her family's health. With six members in her household, they previously drank straight from the well, unaware of the risks. This led to frequent illness, especially diarrhea and stomach pain, causing missed school days and work.

After receiving a water filter and learning about clean water, her family's health improved dramatically. "We no longer get sick like we used to," Mrs. Horm says gratefully. "Our children are in school, and we're healthier and more productive. This water filter has truly changed our lives."



One School's Story

Mr. Tuch, a second-grade teacher at Champa Primary School in Takeo province, reflects on the difference new latrines have made for his students, "Before we received these latrines, it was difficult for students to find a place to go to the toilet, as there weren't enough facilities for everyone," he explains. Limited access meant that both students and teachers often had to wait or go without. Now, with the addition of new latrines, daily life has improved significantly. "These facilities not only give students easy access to toilets but also allow them to practice handwashing, helping them build healthy hygiene habits," Mr. Tuch says. "The students enjoy washing their hands after playing, and it's become so convenient for them." He shares a deep sense of gratitude for the donors and for being part of the SwashE program. "We're committed to maintaining these facilities for future students. They've made a tremendous difference in the health and well-being of our school community."
