Overview

The Sasak people of Lombok are among the most economically disadvantaged groups in Indonesia. Our partner works with them to enhance access to essential life resources through various community-driven initiatives, including water projects, educational programs, and support for individuals with disabilities. The mobility team focuses on assisting underprivileged people living with disabilities. Educational programs aimed to reach 200 new families and provide follow-up education to 350 existing families, equipping them with the knowledge to care for loved ones with disabilities. Additionally, free therapeutic aids, such as wheelchairs, crutches, and physiotherapy equipment, are provided as needed.

Rovita's Story

Rovita, a six-month-old girl born with microcephaly in an impoverished village, initially couldn't hold her head up or roll over due to her condition. Despite facing financial difficulties and the inability to access healthcare in town, her mother pursued therapy for her. With weekly visits, Rovita received help in developing motor skills, such as rolling to her side, lifting her head, and bearing weight on her arms. She also began using a Bumbo chair for support. Now, Rovita has better head control, can hold toys, and interacts more with her family. Her mother has been taught basic physiotherapy skills to ensure Rovita continues to improve.
